Extension 1- Reader Response

Materials:

Paper

Pencil

Crayons, Markers, Color Pencils or Paint

Props for acting out

OR NOTHING--You can act it out or talk about it without any materials.

Learning Targets:

I can write about my connection to the story.

I can write to tell my thoughts about the story.

★To start:

Reading Response Task Card

We just finished reading the book, "Flotsam" It's time for you to respond to what you have read.

You have two choices to respond to:

- 1. Which part of the story made your eyes widen, or made you surprised? Why?
- 2. What if someone kept the camera instead of giving it back to the ocean?

Extension 2 - David Weisner (About the Author) Quick Write or Quick Conversation

Materials:

Computer or other device to access internet

Learning Targets:

I can research to find information about things I like.

★To start:

- 1. Learn more about the author and explore his website: https://www.hmhbooks.com/wiesner/interactive.html
- 2. The website offers information and activities for you to explore.

Quick write/conversation: The purpose of a quick write or quick conversation is to use writing and conversation as thinking tools. Use the following steps to complete your quick write or conversation.

- 1. Read the questions prompts below.
- 2. Take 3 minutes to write down or draw all of your thoughts related to the question. You can do this on any piece of paper!
 - i. To make it a conversation: Talk out loud about your thoughts related to the question. Are someone else's thoughts similar or different than yours?
- o 3. Do not worry about spelling, punctuation or grammar.
- o 4. There are no right or wrong answers we just want to see your thinking!

Quick Write/Conversation Question: Why do you think David Weisner makes books without words? Do you like them? Why or why not?		



Extension 3 - Picture Book/Storyboard

Materials:

Paper

Pencil

Storyboard printed out (or draw your own from the example)

Crayons, color pencils, markers (if you choose)

Learning Targets:

I can create a storyboard to tell a story with pictures and/or words.

★To start:

- 1. A storyboard is an arrangement of pictures that briefly tell a story to entertain us. A comic strip is a good example of a storyboard.

- 2. You can create your own picture book using a storyboard. The storyboards are attached. You can add words if you'd like to write a story with words but you do not have to. The storyboard can be a guide before you create your final book. This is called a draft. OR You can just use the storyboard. There are two options to choose from.
- 3. Share your storyboard, without words, with a friend or family member. I wonder if their perspective is different than yours. Compare what the pictures and the stories they tell mean to you with what they mean to your friend or family member.
